- Improve the nutritional status of pregnant and lactating women, children 6-23 months and less than 5
- Cooking demonstrations

 Improve household food security (income generation, agriculture, functional education etc.)

Credit groups

- Reinforce resilience of communities (Early Warning System, Preparedness Plan)
- Village-based early warning

Improved status for women (living conditions, decision taking)

Cross-cutting objective in all activities



### **Activities Augmented with Community Video**

- 1. IYCF Support Groups (ANJE) and Positive Deviance groups (FAN)
- 2. Credit/savings/income-generation groups (MMD)
- 3. Husband Schools (EdM)
- 4. Mixed Groups with members from existing village-level committees (e.g. grievance, WASH, monitoring and development committees)
- 5. Influencer groups:
  - Selected by beneficiaries
  - Some were composed of village leaders such as religious leaders and village chiefs



#### **Visible Outcomes**

- Reinforced social relations between adolescents and adults
- Improved couple dialogue
- Community-level debates emerged on the different themes
- Raised consciousness of the community
- The development of local initiatives (e.g. manufacturing of handwashing stations in the households)
- Behavior change, especially improved food intake by mothers and young children



### The Technical Advisory Groups (TAG)

#### What?

- 20 focal points from partners and government,
   10 from each region
- Meet every two months
- Decide on video topics, key messages and final videos

#### **Evolved how?**

- Pilot Phase:
  - only implementing partners,
     Digital Green and SPRING
  - led by SPRING
- Today:
  - includes two government entities
  - led by government and co-led by partners

### **Selected Video Topics**

#### In the past

After the 10 videos produced (MIYCN) after formative research, LAHIA also produced:

- 1. How to break the cycle of malnutrition?
- 2. How local foods can feed our future?
- Healthy children despite a low agricultural output
- 4. Malnutrition is reversible when we react on time

#### In the future

- Reduction of women's workload
- Girls in school
- Gender-based violence
